

Cooking Club

Cooking Club gives members the chance to make simple, hands-on recipes they can recreate at home. With guidance from caring staff, youth learn essential cooking skills like food safety, nutrition, food science, measuring ingredients, and reading food labels. They're encouraged to try new foods and expand their taste buds. Cooking Club helps members build lifelong skills, develop healthy habits, and discover that nutritious snacks and meals can be both fun and delicious.

Gardening Club

Our Alcoa Club partners with Blount County Master Gardeners to spark members' interest in gardening. Youth learn about different types of seeds, how to grow food, and how to care for plants at home. They've successfully grown onions, cabbage, radishes, strawberries, greens, green beans, and flowers in the Club garden. Members also take part in cooking activities, learning how to prepare healthy meals with the food they've grown. Gardening Club builds hands-on skills, encourages healthy eating, and shows members the joy of growing their own food.

Academic Success

Summer Enrichment

Summer Enrichment is an eight-week program that keeps young people learning, exploring, and growing when school is out. Research shows many students lose one to two months of progress in math and reading over the summer. By middle school, that can add up to nearly two years of lost learning.

Clubs help close that gap by offering weekly modules filled with engaging, themed activities that align with grade-level standards. Through a project-based learning approach, members dive into hands-on exploration, creative expression, and collaboration, all leading to meaningful final projects.

This fun and engaging approach not only helps youth stay on track for the next school year—it builds critical thinking, problem-solving, and teamwork skills that last a lifetime.

Character + Leadership

On May 27, 2025, Boys & Girls Clubs of the Tennessee Valley opened a new Club in partnership with The Change Center. This collaboration reflects a shared vision of building stronger communities and creating more opportunities for young people to reach their full potential. It's another step in BGCTNV's ongoing commitment to expand its impact and provide life-changing programs to more youth across our region.

The new Club at The Change Center is designed especially for teens, serving about 150 young people each day. Here, teens find a safe, welcoming space to learn, grow, and thrive beyond the school day. Programs focus on building leadership skills and strong character, empowering both male and female members to become confident, responsible, and engaged leaders.

Caring staff lead impactful programs such as Girl Talk, Girls Inc., Passport to Manhood, and Boys to Men. These aren't just activities—they're powerful tools that help members build self-confidence, develop healthy relationships, strengthen emotional resilience, and practice skills like conflict resolution and decision-making.


Character + Leadership Youth of the Year

Health & Well-Being

Summer sports & recreation clinics

This summer, Boys & Girls Clubs of the Tennessee Valley offered high-energy Sports and Recreation Clinics across 12 Club locations, giving youth exciting opportunities to stay active, build confidence, and grow together. From yoga and Zumba to basketball, soccer, martial arts, and swimming, members experienced a wide variety of activities that promoted healthy lifestyles, teamwork, and fun.

These opportunities were made possible through strong community partnerships, including:

- TKJJ–Maryville for martial arts instruction
- One Knox Collective, Footy Lab, and Soccer Shots for soccer training and mentorship
- Capps Sports Camp and the Todd Kelly Foundation for athletic development and youth empowerment
- Knoxville City Parks & Recreation for swimming access and support

Thanks to these collaborations, our Summer Clinics created a positive and impactful environment where Club members could discover new interests, strengthen skills, and stay healthy all summer long.

Member Emotional + Social Health

The Member Emotional & Social Health (MESH) program helps youth build strong social and emotional skills, address mental health needs, and grow resilience. By focusing on positive development, MESH reduces the impact of toxic stress and childhood trauma while giving members the tools they need to thrive.

Our dedicated social work team—supported by bachelor’s and master’s level interns—uses evidence-based strategies such as individual counseling, mentoring, and small-group interventions to strengthen resilience and promote well-being. In addition, staff, members, and families benefit from training, resources, and connections to community partners that extend support beyond the Club.

College + Career Readiness

Research shows that programs introducing young people to career development and job training lead to higher expectations for the future and greater self-sufficiency in adulthood. To support this growth, Boys & Girls Clubs of the Tennessee Valley engages high school students ages 14–18 from Knox, Blount, and Claiborne counties in the YouthForce program.

YouthForce connects teens with businesses that invest in their training and development, giving them real-world experiences that prepare them for success. Through workshops and hands-on opportunities, teens learn how to apply for jobs, strengthen soft skills, and explore careers that align with their interests and talents. They also gain a clearer understanding of the educational and career paths that can help them achieve their goals.

College + Career Readiness

The Pipeline program is designed to help more youth graduate from high school and pursue postsecondary opportunities. Members gain access to a wide range of supports, including academic advising, career exploration, tutoring, and college tours. The program also assists with financial aid, college entrance exams, and application fees—removing barriers and opening doors to future success.

“Being a first-generation student, I found the college process to be very stressful. I had no idea what I needed to complete and had no one around me to ask for help. When I found out about the Pipeline program from a good friend, I immediately signed up. Ms. Bri, my advisor, helped me sign up for college tours and helped me apply to the colleges I wanted. College + Career Readiness

TRIO: Talent Search is a federally funded program that helps students prepare for and succeed in postsecondary education. The program supports youth from economically disadvantaged backgrounds as well as potential first-generation college students, guiding them toward high school graduation and higher education opportunities.

Through TRIO, members receive academic, career, and financial counseling along with access to tutoring, campus tours, and mentoring programs. The program also provides information on financial aid, career exploration, aptitude assessments, and assistance with college entrance exams—equipping students with the tools they need to confidently pursue their future.



For Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2025


